THE LIGHT OF THE RESURRECTION

In her Pulitzer Prize winning book, **Pilgrim at Tinker Creek**, Annie Dillard writes of how poorly we see and experience the world around us: “An infant who has just learned to hold his head up has a frank and forthright way of gazing about him in bewilderment. He hasn’t the faintest clue where he is, and he aims to learn. In a couple of years, what he will have learned instead is how to fake it: he’ll have the cocksure air of a squatter who has come to feel he owns the place. Some unwanted, taught pride diverts us from our original intent, which is to explore the neighborhood, view the landscape, to discover at least where it is that we have been so startlingly set down, if we can’t learn why.”

Why the world, and by extension life, is so obscure can be explained simply through our Catholic understanding of salvation. The darkness of sin and death, from which we were saved through the Cross of Christ, dulls our full experience of creation and life and its goodness. Death bears so heavily upon our consciousness that one commentator, both an anthropologist and a psychologist, suggested that we spend much of our lives subconsciously trying to suppress its reality. We do all we can to put it out of our minds. As a consequence, he concludes, we fail to live life as joyfully as we could because a full life’s experience would bring into focus its end as well, a thought we believe to be intolerable.

The light of the Paschal candle that was lit in the darkness of night before Easter Sunday and continues to be lighted at every Easter season liturgy reminds us that the extraordinary news that Jesus is risen from the dead is meant to help us see our world and our lives in a new light. Living in that light means no longer living in the valley of “the shadow of death” (*Psalms* 23). All the ways we’ve learned to fake it through the years are forgotten: we “put off the old man” (Eph 4:22; Col 3:9) and are “renewed [in] youthfulness of Spirit” (today’s opening prayer for the Third Sunday of Easter).

This light of faith makes it possible for us to once again, in a frank and forthright way, to explore the neighborhood, view the landscape, and to discover where it is and why we have been so startlingly – and lovingly – set down in it.
