REGISTRATION

All families coming for Religious Education for the first time need to be registered in the Parish before enrolling in the Religious Education Program.

Please bring the following required documents when coming to register:

- a) A copy of your child's Baptismal Certificate.
- b) A statement (transcript) of all prior Religious Education if the student is beyond first grade.
- c) First Holy Communion, if the sacrament has already been received.
- d) Registration fees in a check payable to the Church of St. Francis Xavier or through Faith Direct. To pay through Faith Direct please visit <https://membership.faithdirect.net/events/details/946>.

Families currently attending our program need to be re-registered. Please bring the Registration fees in a check payable to the Church of St. Francis Xavier when coming to re-register.

Registration/Re-registration will take place on Sunday August 13, 20 and 27 from 10:30 am to 11:30 am in the West Room.

Tuition for the 2017-2018 school year is \$100 per student, which includes the textbook, supplies, additional instructional materials, catechists' and catechist assistants' stipend. There is also a \$50 Sacramental Fee for children preparing for First Holy Communion (2nd grade) and Confirmation (7th grade) to contribute to Bishop's stipend and Pottery retreat cost. Snacks fee is \$80 per family.

FROM HERE TO ETERNITY

*Did you know that Cremation is
an acceptable form of Christian burial?*

*Did you know that Cremated remains must be cared for
reverently and properly interred in a sacred place?*

*Did you know that there is only one
Catholic Cemetery in Manhattan?*

It is “The Basilica of Saint Patrick’s “ Old Cathedral at 263 Mulberry St New York N.Y. . Over a century ago due to lack of space the practice of interring on Basilica grounds was suspended and limited to the interment of former Catholic Pastors. The Basilica revised the tradition with the introduction of a Columbarium. Due to the overwhelming demand for the niches in the first outdoor Columbarium, more will be added to the Basilica’s historical cemetery, as well as adding many more in the indoor catacombs. Each Columbarium will be hand built by stone artisans and contain niches for the internment of cremated remains. They will fit impeccably into the historic design of the Basilica creating a solemn refuge for the faithful departed and a sanctuary for the bereaved. The urns will be reverently placed inside a secured niche and memorialized with a granite stone face plate on which the names will be meticulously engraved.

For over 200 years the Basilica of St. Patrick’s Old Cathedral has been preparing Catholics for eternity. With the introduction of the Columbaria, they are preparing a sacred and historical place in which to spend it.

If we the Church of St Francis Xavier have the wish to be interred together we will have the opportunity to create our own section in the catacombs.

1. Tower-Fortress-the Magdalene!

We know her as **Mary Magdalene** or Mary of Magdala. We associate this name with a town. But in Luke's Gospel she is "Mary, called Magdalene." This title is similar to "Simon, called Peter." Just as *petra* means rock in Greek, so *migdala* means **tower** or **fortress** in Aramaic and Hebrew. The strongest, largest and most impenetrable spaces in ancient Israel were called *migdal*. In the Bible, the word means fortress temple, watchtower, stronghold, and **elevated pulpit**.

8. The Apostle of all Apostles.

In all four canonical gospels, it is Mary Magdalene to whom the resurrected Christ first **appears**. It is the Magdalene who **announces** the Easter message, and **tells** the other disciples where and how to find their own experiences of resurrection. This is why the Vatican's new preface to Mary of Magdala's Liturgy of the Eucharist is called *de apostolorum apostala*.

2. Diakonos. 3. Benefactor.

4. Patron of the Movement.

The gospels name Mary Magdalene first and foremost as one of the women who **funded** Jesus, allowing the good-news movement to extend from Galilee all the way to Jerusalem. She was his **patron**. In the gospels, the word that describes what Mary Magdalene and her female friends did for Jesus is often translated as "ministered to him." In Greek, the word is *diakonos*. This is the word used for the diaconate in the Roman Catholic Church.

5. Pain bearer.

Mary Magdalene **stood with many women** until the bitter end, witnessing Jesus die on the cross after all of his male companions had scattered.

6. Myrrh bearer.

Mary Magdalene and a friend or two stayed to watch him laid to rest, and entered into the **rituals of mourning and burial**. This is why, in the Greek Orthodox celebration of her Feast, the people call to her in song, "O myrrhbearer."

7. Christ bearer.

Having been fully present through pain, death, burial, and mourning, Mary of Magdala is **the first to bear the resurrected Christ** in her consciousness.

THIRTEEN WAYS OF CALLING OUT TO MARY MAGDALENE

9. Wounded Healer. 10. Truth Defamed.

Some two thousand years into Christian history, the Catholic Church **elevated** Mary Magdalene's feast last year, declaring "**it is right** that the liturgical celebration of this woman should have **the same rank of Feast** as that given to the celebration of the Apostles." The Greek Orthodox celebration recognizes her as a **healer** in her own right. ("He received you as a true disciple, for you turned all your love toward Him. Henceforth you would yourself work many healings.") Whether the focus is on the expunged seven demons mentioned by Luke in connection with her name, or the seventy-times-seven ways she has been **demonized** by slander in the course of Christian history, Mary Magdalene **rises** out of the muck, **brandishing truth and healing**.

11. Proclaimer. 12. Catalyst.

13. Fearless Leader.

Mary the Magdalene had the **resources** to build the ministry behind Jesus' ministry. She had the **courage** to stand witness with her friends, as they all lost a friend to crucifixion. She had the **consciousness** to experience the resurrection and speak joyful truth in a time of fear and despair. She continues to offer all of this **to us**. Despite the name-calling, her name survives, and **we call out to her today**.
