The Friendship of Jesus

Dear Parishioners:

Have you ever had a best friend? It is one of life's great gifts. In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks of having chosen and befriended all who have remained with him. When Jesus offers us his friendship, it is part of a chain of love that begins with his Father. God the Father pours out the self-gift that is Jesus, who offers friendship to all.

Jesus teaches us to keep the chain of love unbroken. He tells us to pay the love forward to others, and to befriend them in the way he has befriended us. He speaks of this as a "commandment." Such a commandment seems odd. How can you be commanded to "love" another person? Isn't love supposed to be a free choice?

In biblical parlance, "love" is not about the feelings you have for another. Rather, love designates deeds of caring kindness that communicate that others are part of the chosen community of the friends of God. We are commanded to act this way toward others, no matter how we might feel about them, whether or not they reciprocate the love offered.

Jesus showed the kind of love he commanded when he washed his disciples' feet. He did not skip Peter and Judas. He explains this service as the greatest kind of love: the willingness to lay down one's life for one's friends. This is not an obligatory service, such as a slave is required to render. The love of friendship is freely chosen self-surrender.

The most challenging part of this kind of love is that friends of Jesus are asked to embrace not only beloved community members, but especially those to whom they are not naturally drawn. When this seems a humanly impossible task, Jesus assures his disciples that when they ask God in his name, God will provide the needed grace.

The farewell discourse in the Gospel of John reveals the identity of Jesus. The first images about him are those of the vine, the living water and the bread of life. In today's passage, Jesus is presented as one with the authority to initiate new commandments.

Jesus replaces Moses, giving a new "law," a new commandment. The giving of commandments is a divine prerogative. In the Exodus story, Moses first "received," and only later "gave" the law. But Jesus initiates, of his own authority, a new command: "Love one another, as I have loved you."

The originality of this commandment is less in the values expressed, after all, the injunction to love others is found in the Hebrew scriptures. Its newness is in Jesus' assuming God's role as the originator of commandments.

The love referred to is agape (self-surrender), one of several Greek terms for love. It refers specifically to the kind of love characteristic of the believing community, not the love that desires union with the beloved (eros or erotic love), or the love of siblings (adelphos or brotherly love). This love is the Spirit. This love is the air Christians breathe. It is the human experience of God's life manifested in community. It is one of the features that marks the continuing real presence of the Risen One.

Today's epistle from John interprets the gospel. It describes the very essence of God as love. This love was revealed in Christ's death for sinners. Christian love flows from sharing God's very own life of love through communion with the Risen Christ.

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The first reading from the Acts of the Apostles focuses on the Spirit, who animates divine love. The Roman soldier Cornelius represents the Gentiles who enter Christianity through Peter’s initiative. Peter stands for foundational Christianity and affirms that God has no partiality. Divine love knows no skin color, gender, or religion. It is not stopped by national boundaries. Its desire is to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, teach the illiterate, and empower the destitute.

The household of Cornelius receives the Spirit in a “little Pentecost,” with people praising God in tongues. This prayer most likely was not an intelligible language, but a rhythmic and lilting flow of syllables that externalizes deep inner awareness of the Spirit’s presence.

Peter recognizes that in every nation, whoever fears God and acts uprightly is acceptable to God. The “fear” about which Peter speaks is not cringing before God, who has the power to destroy you. Rather, it is to become enthralled with awe before the Holy One whose immense love is beyond comprehension. Such feeling of awe inspires the response of acting “uprightly”, that is, in right relation toward the Creator and all creation.

Next weekend the church will celebrate the Lord’s Ascension. It is also Mother’s Day so Emily Gumper will offer a mom’s reflection at all of the Masses. My classmate Fr. John Mossi S.J. from the new Jesuits West Province will also be on hand to represent the province’s advancement office and our appreciation for our mothers.

This is the season of the outpouring of divine blessings. Our newly baptized community members gave the gift of their horticultural service to refurbish the garden at the front of the church plaza on 43rd and SE Powell. Last weekend our second graders received their First Communion. This first weekend of May is a reminder that the whole month belongs to our Mother Mary and praying the rosary. As Pope Francis says in his latest letter, “Rejoice and Be Glad,” we are all called to be saints. Let us live in the joy of our call to sanctity.
